### **North Craven Flower Club**

Our Guest demonstrator at our May meeting was Jill Perrins from the Catkins flower shop in Settle. She made 6 designs using a variety of greenery and beautiful flowers.





The design to the left was an all-round design that started with various pieces of greenery such as ruscus and hellebore leaves. She then added lilac coloured clematis, followed by purple statice with white centres. To lift the arrangement, she finally

added some white mini gerbera.

In contrast to the subdued colours of the previous

arrangement, the design to the right had the very colourful sunflowers as the main feature. Although not yet opened, the two stems of lillies form the height of the arrangement. Also included were more stems of statice and finally some short stems of white hydrangea.

The arrangement below was done in a




milk churn, which Jill said is currently very popular for weddings. The framework was made by adding



various pieces of greenery such as cotoneaster to give height and width. Also white beam and hellebore leaves. Flowers of the hellebore were also included as well as white stocks with their lovely perfume, white roses, white lisianthus and white chrysanthemums.



As Jill's demonstration was entitled King and Country, there had to be crown somewhere and a very rustic one was the frame for this design. A large green orchid formed the height of the design to the left. Silver edged Euonymus covered the base of the design. Short pieces of Scots pine were added to echo the Kings love of Scotland as well as the pheasant feathers. The finishing touch was some white peonies with a yellow centre.





The design below also started with

laurel and white beam. Cotoneaster was also added before the flowers of pink wax flower, white lisianthus, blue campanula, and small white hydrangea heads that were nestled in amongst the greenery.



Our June meeting was a visit to the Himalayan Garden and Sculpture Park near Ripon. The next meeting in Hellifield Village Hall will be on 13th July at 7.30pm when our guest demonstrator will be Louise Jones with a demonstration entitled 'Elements'.

Another note for diaries will be our afternoon tea at Langcliffe Village Hall on Sunday, 17th September.

There will be no meeting in August but we will meet again on 14th September.

## Village planting

You will have noticed that the planting was slightly later this year (due to worries about frost damage). Everything is in place now and hopefully over the next month or so will fill out and look attractive. The funds for plants for the troughs and Village Marker are donated by the Parish Council out of the precept monies collected as part of Council Tax. So, in effect, all Council Tax payers in the village are contributing to these plants.



As I write this article, 12 days after planting, there has already been some vandalism to the troughs and to Maralyne's triangle. Should you notice any vandalism or anyone messing about with the plants, please report this to the Parish Council, me or Maralyne, so if we know who the perpetrators are, we can report it to the Police and also replace or repair any damage. Seven hours work went into planting up the troughs and the Village Marker, and it isn't appreciated that people (of any age) feel justified in destroying it!

As last year, the Village Hall have provided their own hanging baskets and kindly held a coffee morning to raise additional funds for the wider Village planting. I received some of these funds and have replaced the two large shrubs at the bottom of Hammerton and added some bedding plants. In time these large shrubs will be covered in pretty pink flowers, which should attract bees and butterflies, but that may not happen this year – we will just have to wait and see, as plants sometimes take a while to get established in a new environment. The rest of the money raised has been given to Maralyne to carry on her wonderful work around the railway underpass area.

The photos attached show the Village marker on Gisburn Road and the stone trough provided and maintained by the Swinbank family, which always looks amazing.

I hope you enjoy all the plants which make Hellifield an even more attractive place to live.

As a child, I often played cards and dominoes with my family. I had many aunts, uncles, cousins and a gran who lived in Newcastle. On our visits there, I recall fun times when we all sat round my gran's dining table playing 'Chase the Ace' – an ideal card game for lots of people. I have a sneaking feeling that as the youngest I seemed to, uncannily, win more often than not. However, back home in West Yorkshire with mum, dad, sister and family friends, I had to fight my corner and rely on my developing skill and competitiveness to achieve that winning glory.

In Britain the most popular league and pub domino game is Fives and Threes. It was a regular Sunday lunchtime retreat for my Dad to his local pub in Morley, The Rock, where he played Fives and Threes with his mates. There were often 'words' when he returned home much later than the agreed 2.00 pm, with the roast slightly charred and the veggies, shall we say, not at their best.

During my twenties and early thirties, when I had fled the nest, I was lucky that my partner and some of our friends also found great pleasure from this form of entertainment. There has been many a Saturday night when various card games such as Cribbage, Whist, Gin Rummy and Hearts have continued into the early hours of Sunday morning, accompanied by several glasses of wine – not conducive to remembering who has played what.

My son has also, from a very early age, been inducted in the art of playing cards and dominoes. We didn't let him win either, unless he did so genuinely. Now at 32 when he returns home for visits, we inevitably get out the cards and try to remember the rules of Canasta.

So, I was delighted when HelliGames started at the village hall on a Wednesday afternoon. As well as cards and dominoes, other games are brought along. I have become enthralled with a new game to me, 'Triominos', which is classic dominoes with a twist. As the name suggests, the tiles are triangular in shape with a number in each corner, the numbers having to be matched on one side by your opponent. It can be frustrating and great fun at the same time.

When playing this week with Maralyne and Joy P, we chatted about why we looked forward to our Wednesday afternoon sessions. Joy P said she loved the company with a different mix of people than those she met at other events: "a good way of getting involved with community life". Maralyne felt it was ideal for her brain stimulation and laughingly said it stopped her falling asleep on the sofa: "a great way of having social interaction and meeting new people".

We all agreed that we would love it if others from the village came along to join us, especially if they had a new game we could learn. I am sure there are many people, like myself, who grew up with this fun past-time, who may like to re-awaken their competitive spirit. Beware if you do come and find yourself playing Scrabble with Joy P, as she has an unnatural way of finding amazing high number letters that fall on double letter and triple word scores: what's more, combining with more than one word! Maralyne says it is because she does a lot of crosswords. My view is she is just too clever for me, but without doubt, I will more confidently take her on at Cribbage or Fives and Threes.

### Friends of the Dales is running 'Capturing Hellifield's Past' on Saturday, 8 July at the Village Hall


There will be two sessions for the people of Hellifield: one in the morning and one in the afternoon of the 8th of July.

### **Destination well-being**

Once again Northern Trains have made arrangements for their "Year In Industry" students to have a placement with the Bentham Line (Leeds-Morecambe Community Rail Partnership).

This is the fifth such cohort of university remit. students who take a break from their academic studies between the second and third year to sample working for a large organisation; they come from a number of academic institutions across the north of England studying a diverse range of subjects that includes Geography, Business Studies, Information Technology and other subjects. They are placed in a wide variety of offices between Manchester and York covering roles in operational management, finance or support services. The only occasion when they meet during their placement as a distinct group is on the placement with the CRP.

They work closely with Brian Haworth, Community Rail Partnership Officer for the Bentham Line to prepare a project of their own choice which will address issues around the communities along the routes and those who use train services to improve an aspect of the travel experience.

This year's topic is DESTINATION WELLBEING. They are particularly concerned about the wellbeing of their peers, especially in the aftermath of COVID related restrictions on movement and socialising. This will be explored through various themes such as: culture, accessing the outdoors, reflecting on heritage, active life-styles and social interactions. They are due to launch their project in the first week of July this year.

"I am very much looking forward to what imaginative interpretations they can bring to this topic," said Brian Haworth, and I am sure that the final work will be of lasting benefit to the wider community along the line as well as giving them a good grounding in the working world."

We looked at the makeup of the dairy cow for milk production, this was in preparation for the District Rally the following week. We all enjoyed refreshments after, thanks to the Wellock family.

Saturday the 7th of May members travelled to Bentham Auction for the Settle District Rally, where the four clubs - Burton, Coniston Cold, Lawkland and Rathmell - competed in many different classes from baking to livestock judging. There was a great turnout. Coniston had success in the following classes: Intermediate Dairy, Intermediate Beef, Junior breeding Sheep, Mystery Judging, Junior Egg throwing and producing a Young Farmers Christmas Card.

Two days later, on the 9th of May, members met at James Middleton's Agricultural Services, for a machinery valuation evening. We started off outside with tractors and trailers and moved on inside to smaller partsfilters, oils and tyres. 

### Hellifield's Railway Navvy Huts


In 1873, with the Midland Railway's Settle to Carlisle line under construction, the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway started to extend its line from Blackburn (which had terminated at Chatburn) onwards towards Hellifield to form a junction with the Midland line. As the line approached Hellifield, accommodation was needed for the many workers and their families involved in the construction, so a settlement of wooden huts was established on the land alongside the railway line from Town end bridge as far as the present-day Kendal Close.

The line opened in June 1880 but a look at the census of 1881 shows a total of nine huts still on the site occupied by 62 persons including many family groups. (It would seem many of the family groups shared the same huts). Most of the general labourers had begun to move on at this point so the huts occupants tended to be the more skilled workers such as stonemasons and blacksmiths etc and also some employees of the Lancashire and Yorkshire railway company who were lodging with the families as the houses of L&Y terrace would not be ready for occupation until

1882. A house building boom in the village followed in the coming years in order to accommodate the evergrowing numbers of railway workers with new streets appearing such as Brook Street and Thorndale Street.

By the beginning of the 1900s most of the navvy huts had been demolished or sold off but two remained and were known locally as Primrose Hill and were occupied by two families consisting of 11 persons until their demolition around 1910. These huts are shown on the right of the photograph below and on the OS map





extract from 1894 shown above. It is also interesting to note from the map that the original Town End bridge, which carried the road over the beck, only took up half the road width at this time, the other half being a ford.

For many years my family had allotments on the land alongside the LYR line that extended from the Back



Lane bridge as far as the present-day subway. We had an interesting collection of old huts and homemade greenhouses and cold frames on the site. My grandparents are shown in the 1920's photograph (below, to the left), alongside some of these constructions.

One hut in particular took my interest as a youngster, as it had a wooden sliding shutter on one side, with a small counter or desk top attached underneath it on the inside of the hut. Asking my father what this was for, he told me he believed the hut had been purchased by my great grandfather from the navvy settlement and was thought to have been the hut where the navvies collected their pay, hence the shutter and counter. I have not been able to find any evidence to support this story and the hut crumbled away many years ago, but it still made for a great tale for a young lad to ponder on at that time just the same!

### Unusual properties and land for sale in the Dales

I dare say I'm not alone in wondering what I will spend all my money on when I win the Lottery. I occasionally look at Rightmove (other property websites are available) to see what swanky houses are up for sale in the Yorkshire Dales. At the moment, I could spend £11 million on Marske Hall near Richmond or a mere £5.6 million on Lawkland Hall between Settle and Austwick. It's likely that I couldn't afford these two even if I did win the Lottery.

I was amazed to find that there were 22 The Signalman's House houses costing over £1 million in the Yorkshire Dales, three of which are just down the road: one in Long Preston, one in Coniston Cold and one at Malham Moor. Alongside the really expensive places are semi-detached houses, terraced houses, bungalows and plots of land for sale. Nearly all of them are out of reach of my budget. Still, there's no harm in looking, and dreaming.

Fisher Hopper Estate Agents put the Signalman's House on the market last year. It's a remote cottage described as needing 'quite a bit of love'. (That's estate agent speak for 'totally wrecked inside'). The Agent claims that it has sparked worldwide interest after going on sale. The former signalman's house sits between the Settle to Carlisle railway and the Yorkshire Three Peaks route. You probably walked past it if you've ever walked up Whernside.

You'd need a 4x4 or a quad bike to get there from Ribblehead. Oh, and by the way, although it had no mains electricity or running water, it went on the market for £300,000. Nobody's


