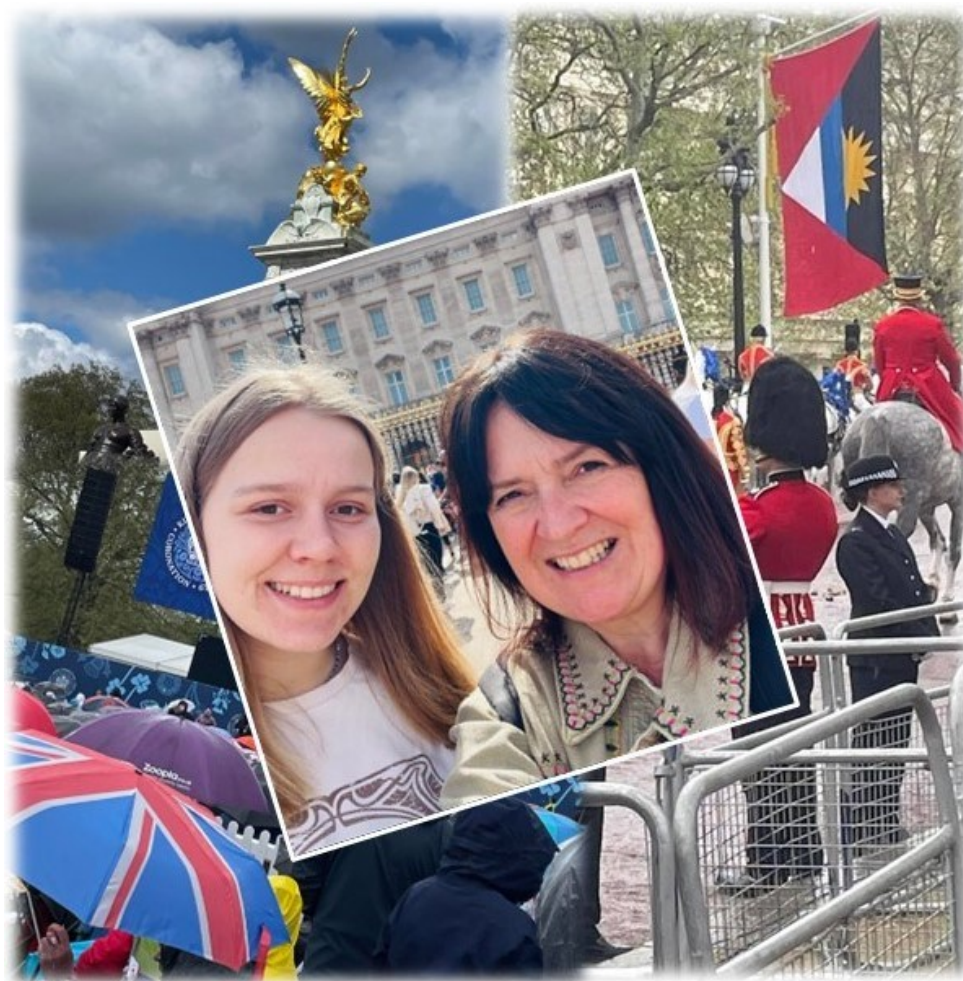

Editorial

May 6th 2023 will be a standout day for many people. Each will have a memory of the Coronation of King Charles III. The King and Queen have been crowned and central to the service the King has promised to serve us all. Much was made of the fact that many of the rituals we observed and shared were as they were in 1066 when William I was crowned. King Charles is the 41st monarch since then although there are two, Edward V and Edward VIII who were never crowned. Thus, the service, the promises and commitment link us back almost 1,000 years. But of course, there was also the associated pageantry, the perfection of the processions, the music and the knowledge that so many volunteers from around the country had been asked to share in the special day. The supporting crowds played their part by their good humour and consideration for others. The crowded Mall and the balcony scenes were, as for every such major event, wonderful to watch and share.

I found myself reminiscing about Queen Elizabeth's coronation in 1953. The day before, our newspapers were full of the stunning news that Edmund Hillary and Sherpa Tenzing had conquered Everest so the country was already in a mood for celebration.

My mother, as a GFS leader, had gone off to London having been awarded a seat in the Mall. My sister, brother and I were staying with a neighbour who was one of the few to have a TV set. There must have been 20 of us crowded round an 18- inch screen to watch the event in a darkened room. Afterwards, even though it was still drizzling, it seemed as though the whole village congregated in the nearby park



to celebrate. Our heavily polluted (highest dust fall in Europe) industrial village on the north bank of the Tees, still showing the scars of bombs, was blessed, like Hellifield, with a warm, friendly community which helped make it a memorable day. I still have my coronation plate to prove it.

As a young cricketer there was more to come that summer, for in August we were at the Oval running across the ground when England reclaimed The Ashes. Many years later clips were shown on TV and there was my 9 year old brother and me standing waiting for the balcony appearance and the trophy ceremony.

It was a year I remember well.

Members and friends of St Aidan's Mothers' Union greatly enjoyed a most fascinating and illuminating talk presented by Fr David Hope. He spoke about his career within the Anglican Ministry, having been Bishop of Wakefield, Bishop of London and Archbishop of York.



He was appointed a Knight Commander of the Royal Victorian Order (KCUO), an honour within the gift of Her Majesty the Queen and was created a life peer in 2005.

Fr David gave an interesting insight into the logistics involved in the organisation of enormous services in St Paul's Cathedral and Westminster Abbey, events attended by hundreds of people. The Funeral of the late Queen Elizabeth II was one such service.



In addition, Fr David had been honoured and delighted to receive an invitation to the Coronation Service of King Charles III and Queen Camilla. He had brought along his invitation and kindly allowed us to take photographs. We look forward with eager anticipation to hearing about Fr David's attendance at such an historic and significant event.

North Craven Flower Club April Meeting

At our April meeting, we welcomed Andrew and Carole Lay who own and run Lay of the Land in Settle. We spent an enjoyable time in their company learning about filling planters - from when to plant up containers to what to put in them! Whilst Andrew gave us lots of tips on how to get the best out of our planters, Carole put together 7 planters explaining why she had chosen those plants and how to best display them in the pots; these were then raffled at the end of the evening.



Carole made this herbaceous planter (left) with Bloody Dinosaur Heuchera, Erysimum Canaries Yellow, Carex Comans 'Amazon 'mist', Geum Mrs Bradshaw, Salvia 'Caradonna', Aquilegia Alpina, Aster Alpinus Violet and Violas. I have listed all the plants it contained to show how many plants

they suggested would then provide a good show for a long period of time. They told us that this planter would probably keep going for 2 years but would then need to be split up and the plants could then be planted in the garden.

One of the standout plants that they used were some red and yellow Ranunculi. The flowers grow from bulbs that can be planted in the Autumn or early Spring but if planted in the ground can only tolerate conditions above -6°C. They will do better in our area in a pot that can be moved into a greenhouse for winter protection.

When growing in pots you need to choose a good potting compost and a pot that has good drainage. Using broken pot bits in the bottom will aid drainage. Some say you should soak your bulbs before planting others say that they will get the moisture from the compost.

Plant them about 3-5 cm deep and space 6-10 cm apart. They then take little looking after except to ensure the compost is kept moist but not wet. Cutting the flowers encourages more to grow and the flowers stand well in water. Arrange your cut ranunculus in just a little water, as the hairy stems don't like it too deep. The flowers will drink a lot of water so keep topping it up little and often. When the leaves in your potted ranunculi die down at the end of the season take them out of the pot and leave them to dry in the sun for a couple of days. Then store them in a cool dry, well-ventilated place like a garage or garden shed. You can store

them in a cloth bag but don't use a plastic one as this will encourage the bulbs to sweat and then rot. Ranunculus are a large family that include buttercups. The flowers that we see in the shops from January through to May, are a relative newcomers from Italy that can be used in arrangements and wedding bouquets as an alternative to peonys.

We won't be having a meeting in June but instead we will be visiting a garden but will be back again in July when our demonstrator will be Louise Jones with a demonstration entitled Elements. Visitors are always welcome. Our meetings start at 7.30pm in Hellifield Institute.

View from the Vicarage

And the view from the vicarage as I write this- in the first week of May- is a big green field bedecked with yellow meadow-flowers, lit up by clear, bright sunlight. Little wonder that mid-to-late spring is my favourite time of the year; that sense of breaking out of winter's dark (if not, these days, necessarily cold) grip which comes when the clocks go forward is accompanied by the arrival of sweet scents, new colour and (quite co-incidentally, as it's completely the opposite in the Southern Hemisphere!) the joy too of Easter-tide for Christians. And, looking back on my childhood, a mid-April birthday nearly always unencumbered by school couldn't help lift the mood as well! (In fact, I remember being at work for the first time on my birthday- my 21st- and feeling slightly put out that others had call on my time that day, even if a brief visit to a City of London pub at lunchtime made slight amends...)

I've remarked several times since we moved here a year ago that everything in our natural environment seems so much bigger, more colourful, more vibrant than in the suburban or inner-city locations I've lived in before. Yes, Bournemouth had (and still has, I presume!) its marvellous beach but the rest of that large urban area was filled with traffic and often dreary. Harlow in Essex was grey and chilly in the winter, and often hot and stuffy in the summer, reflecting the post-war housing estates that drew thousands from the bombed-out remains of London's East End, although there were (thanks to the town's careful design) plenty of small green spaces and some lovely cherry trees- a reminder of the orchards that were cut down to make way for people and "progress". And, of course, wherever you live, there are always good, uplifting places to find if you're prepared to invest a little time and effort. But we are very lucky indeed, at our time in life, to have come to live somewhere that has a protected "green space" on the doorstep that's not the odd half-acre but 841 square miles (and even with my OCD tendencies I'm going to struggle to visit the whole of our National Park....)

Mind you, the distractions of contemporary life are such that, even

in this part of the world, it's too easy to lift our eyes not "unto the hills" (as Psalm 121 says) but unto Twitter and Facebook on our phones. We had some visitors after Easter, and we took them on a brief scenic tour to and from Stainforth Force and around the area: interested at first in my descriptions of what we could see, the eyes of my car passengers soon drifted off to social media and emails. I don't think I was being particularly boring (!)- just a reflex habit by them that we all tend to have, me included. So I'm going to make a summer - as it's a bit late for a New Year- resolution: only to look at my phone when out if (a) there's something important/urgent to do or (b) it's dark. Christians believe in a God who made us and the world and called it "very good"- but even if you don't share this view, there is surely still so much to enjoy and appreciate when we get out and about. And who knows what we might see, and who we might meet if we put the phones down for a few minutes?

The Village Green - Then and Now



Above: Hellifield Village Green in the Late 19th and Early 20th Century

The drawing above shows the Village Green as it would have looked around the early years of the 20th Century. Recognisable features are the Black Horse, Hellifield House, and Rook Cottage on the right hand side. Also featured in the centre are elements of the Joiners which faced the Black Horse across the main road and next to it the building known as Grove House, with a Barn attached. The house itself became the Vicarage when St Aidan's was constructed. Hellifield House (now the Social Club) was constructed in the late 18th Century. A private house, it had been a residence for the Hardacre Family (Gentry) for over 100 years at this point. The coachhouse and stables were situated where Hellifield Garage now stands. The current occupant at the time of the above picture was William King Hardacre, the last of his line and an owner of much land and property in the Hellified district. Tree planting on the Green took place around this time. Prior to this it was enclosed in parts and used for grazing land. The Black Horse looks familiar and the current wing where the

dining room is situated would have have been used as stabling at this time. The Inn (17th Century) has been enlarged and structurally altered during its lifetime, but its main purpose in times past was to act as a Coaching Inn where horses were changed and passengers were fed and watered. Rook Cottage is a former Toll House, and dates back to the early 19th Century. It is a Grade II Listed Building.

Today the view is roughly the same. The trees, and their descendants, which were planted on the green around the time of the first picture have grown and matured. This view looks less idyllic and reflects changing times. Ahernes is now situated in the area across from Rook Cottage, and the business has been a feature of Hellifield for decades. The family firm started business in 1895 and also operates from premises in Settle. Although the Green has largely been tarmacked for car parking, the current aspect is still pleasing and is a focal point in one of the oldest parts of the Village.

There are actually two ‘Greens’ in Hellifield. The other one is situated down Gisburn Road along the lane to Hellifield Peel.

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The "Lanky" Gang - A Hellifield railway track gang in the 1950s and 1960s



From 1948 to the late 1960s my father was a member of the railway track gang that looked after a length of track on the old Lancashire and Yorkshire railway line, this was always known to older residents of Hellifield as the "lanky" line. The gang's length ran from Hellifield south junction as far as Newsholme station. In those days the men were known as "Platelayers" a name that goes back to the early days of horse drawn wagonways where the platelayers would lay L-shaped metal plates on stone slabs that were used to guide the wagon wheels on the trackways linking the coal mines and quarries to the ports or other loading facilities.

On the railways the platelayer's job was to check the track for any problems and to replace any damaged sections of rails or sleepers, oiling and greasing the point work and cutting back any trees or bushes that had grown on the lineside in addition to mowing the grass on the embankments

and cuttings or removing it by controlled burning.

Another job that occurred mainly in the autumn and winter months was fog duty or "fogging" as it was known to the gangs, this required members of the gang to be stationed day and night during foggy conditions in small concrete "sentry boxes" located near the signal posts to warn the train drivers of the signals position. This was done by placing warning detonators on the track at a measured distance from the signal, these detonators exploded when the locomotive's wheels passed over them alerting the train crew to slow down and then the fog man would signal the train using a handlamp with red and green aspect lenses.

Another winter job was snow clearing and unfreezing points and signal mechanisms, the hard winter of 1963 was to prove a difficult time for the track gangs. On weekends the gang could find themselves being used on any major track relaying jobs as far

away as Preston and Manchester.

Photo 1 The first photo shows three members of the gang beginning to walk their length and are shown passing the Grange on Gisburn road, they are L to R- my father John Pearcy, Bob Aitchison and Jerry Gibson, the photo was taken in April 1957 in the days before Hi-Viz clothing made an appearance! This photo hung for many years in the gang's red brick cabin that was located on the lineside opposite the farm buildings on Peel Green and was rescued by my father before the cabin was demolished after the gang was made redundant in the 1960s. The second photo shows my father (third from the left), the man next to him in the trilby hat and tie will probably be the "ganger" (foreman) . I'm not sure exactly what the equipment being used is for, perhaps something to align two sections of rail before joining them with a fishplate?? Most of the manual jobs done by the track gangs have now been taken over by rail mounted tamping vehicles while specialist rail recording trains monitor the tracks for any faults; cutting back the grass and

trees from the lineside only seems to be done when the branches are actually touching the trains these days

Photo 2. In this photo my father is carrying a set of rolled up flags so he would have been acting as lookout man, positioned further along the line from the gang his job would be to warn the gang of approaching trains (using a whistle at this time) and to signal the train crew with the red or green flags.

Photo 3 shows some of the gang outside one of their tool sheds, plenty of hand tools including scythes for the grass cutting can be seen inside. My father is third from the left with Fred Walker holding the spade to his right. Platelayers seem to run in my family! As well as my father two of my great grandfathers were gangers, Robert Parker for the Midland and later Lancashire and Yorkshire railways at Hellifield and John Pearcy for the North-Eastern railway at Brough near Hull.

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Gardens Secret or Otherwise - Part 2

In the April magazine I wrote about my interest in gardening and the way in which my skills and knowledge fall short of my aspirations and invited the gardeners of Hellifield share their secrets with me.

If you have a lawn cut it before you go away and trim back any bushes or shrubs that burglars could hide behind.
