## View from the Vicarage

I mentioned this time last year that early November, in the Church of England and many other Christian traditions, has become what I call the "season of remembrance." This is primarily due to a coincidence of the calendar, as our national Remembrance Sunday (recalling the Armistice on 11/11/1918) comes close to the old feast of All Souls' Day, when medieval Christians would pray for the souls of the dead. And once more we'll be having our own opportunity to remember our departed loved ones on Sunday 5th November at St Aidan's Hellifield (3pm start) - please see page 21 in the magazine for details.

But I've been thinking about 'remembrance' - or at least remembering events, places and people – in a slightly more light-hearted way recently, too. I had a hilarious couple of hours with my oldest friend at the start of October as we marked exactly 40 years since our first meeting, in our first week at Durham University. We recalled some of the rather crazy characters from our time there - are University lecturers allowed to be eccentric any more? We reminisced about various amusing moments in the lower-grade professional sport that have kept us entertained over four decades: football and cricket matches that were unbelievably boring to watch (we generally find these things give us more to talk about than games that are exciting!) and some characters, whether obscure, outspoken or both. who've enlivened our friendship for so lona.

Of course, trying to explain this even to my nearest and dearest family has proved rather difficult: it's a bit of a middle-age-man-thing, maybe (although Nicky and I, in our turn, frequently remember bizarre goings-on in church from years ago: it was easier

to laugh at things going pear-shaped when I wasn't the vicar!) One thing my friend and I did agree on, though, was that the world has become a much more serious place since we were students together. Not in terms of big threats to world peace and the like after all, we were both young adults in the late and dangerous phase of the Cold War, not to mention the activities of the IRA - and current anxieties seem like so much of a re-run. No. we couldn't help thinking that there's so much fear of causing offence now that folk are reluctant to be seen to find anything funny or even mildly entertaining if there's a danger that someone might call us out for it. Churches, especially, were always at their most healthy when clergy and congregation alike could recognise their fallibilities, own up to them with a smile and get on with the complicated business of learning to love folk you didn't necessarily get on with! But that's much harder now.

Of course I would never suggest that genuinely offensive words or deeds were acceptable (although for me it's another matter that they should somehow automatically be criminalised, as is increasingly the case today). Seeing the humour in other people or situations should always be kept within suitable boundaries. But I do hope that those who are 17 now (as I was when I met my friend at Durham for the first time) might be able, 40 years from now, to sit with their own friends and laugh at the silly and harmless things that human beings so often say and do. It's a very good therapy on a grey and damp late Autumn day.

# Hellifield traffic speed monitoring – an update

Progress to report at last! After struggling for the best part of a year to get Public Liability Insurance (PLI) cover for the proposed installation of Vehicle Activated Signage (VAS) equipment for our Village, the Parish Council has now agreed to extend their existing PLI policy to cover the equipment. They have also agreed to purchase the equipment on behalf of the CSW Team, so that the equipment can be purchased without VAT.

Our new County Councillor, Cllr Simon Myers, has also agreed to support the Project by providing funding for the annual maintenance contract that we are seeking with the VAS supplier. (Hellifield has to buy the equipment from NYC Highways approved suppliers of VAS equipment.)

NYC Highways has surveyed the proposed sites for the equipment and has approved them. We will have a mounting post installed at each site: one adjacent to St Aidan's Church for westbound traffic and one near the Village School for eastbound traffic. Both sites will have solar-power panels and the VAS sign will be rotated between the two posts, to a program approved by NY Police, with deployments permitted for up to 6 months. Data retrieval will be initially on a weekly/monthly cycle. Although the 'War Chest' for our equipment now stands at just under £6.000, we are still looking for additional financial support because, ideally, we would like to have equipment at both locations, with the possibility of a third position on the access road to the Gisburn Road (A682), which has been proposed to NYC Highways.

The Village CSW Team deployments are continuing and we are still looking for volunteers to join the team and help with our traffic speed monitoring. Sadly, in July, we said farewell to Tim and Jan Crompton on their departure to Settle. They had both been involved with the team since its inception in 2019 and we would like to thank them for their help and organizational activities in supporting road safety in our Village over the past 4 years. I would also like to thank the remaining members of the team, who have been stalwarts in trying to get road users to slow down in this area of Yorkshire – unlike the absent NY Police CCTV Teams. Hopefully, with the VAS operations in Long Preston and Gargrave, we can now move towards a consistent system for managing traffic speeds in this part of our county - to the benefit of all of US.

As an after note: there has been quite a lot in the national press recently about the setting of 20mph speed limits in certain parts of the Country.

Previously, this policy was rejected by NYCC, and it is not the intention of the Village CSW Team to pursue this. All we want is for drivers to respect the displayed speed limits and to drive safely within the actual conditions.

# 'Hellifield to Belfast return, please'

During the golden age of rail travel, in the period up to the beginning of the first world war, it was possible to travel from Hellifield to Belfast and return on one inclusive ticket. An example of one of these tickets from my own collection is shown on the front page of the magazine.


When the Midland Railway took over the "little" North-Western Railway Company it inherited the North Western's steamer service from the pier at Morecambe (the present-day stone jetty) to Barrow-in-Furness where connections were made with sailings bound for Belfast.

With the strong currents and constantly shifting sands of Morecambe Bay the pier often silted up, making it difficult for larger vessels to dock there. Looking for a solution to this problem and also with an eye to further expanding its services, the Midland Railway was able to secure some land at Heysham and began to construct a large deep-water harbour with rail connections for goods and passengers.

This new harbour was brought into service in 1904. The passenger station at the harbour is shown below in a commercial postcard of the time. For the opening of the harbour the Midland had four new steamers built to add to its fleet to operate the company's new services to Belfast and Douglas (Isle of Man). One of those new vessels was the SS. Donegal, shown to the right in a postcard of the period. This vessel was later requisitioned by the war department for use as a hospital ship during the first world war, but tragically it was to be sunk in the English Channel by a German U-Boat in April 1917, with the loss of 40 lives.

To serve the new harbour at Heysham the Midland Railway introduced a Belfast boat train service. This train left St. Pancras station, London, at 5pm and travelled over the Midland main line to Hellifield. After leaving Hellifield the train turned off the main line to Carlisle at Settle Junction, travelling via Bentham and Wennington to Lancaster and then on to Heysham (267 miles from St. Pancras). There, it would join a steamer to take the passengers on to Belfast. With good sea conditions Belfast could be reached round about






6.30am the next morning. After 1923 when the Midland became part of the London Midland and Scottish Railway company the train was re-routed to run from London Euston station and was renamed "The Ulster Express". This train travelled along the west coast mainline to Lancaster (connecting services were provided from Leeds via Skipton and Hellifield) and then to Morecambe where the express locomotive was replaced by a smaller tank locomotive to haul the coaches over the branch line to Heysham harbour. A Morecambe bound Midland Railway train is shown leaving Hellifield in the period postcard below.

It is still possible to travel to Heysham harbour by rail from Hellifield today for services to the Isle of Man and Ireland although a change of train needs to be made at Lancaster now. In the present timetable it seems there is only one train per day in each direction from Lancaster to Heysham and of course, the ships are no longer operated by the railway companies these days.

#### September and October



A few months ago a little black cat began visiting our garden to eat the hedgehog food, she was that hungry and thin. But it was her poorly eye that got us worried. One of them was closed and looked in a bad way.

We made her a shelter in the garden and fed her, but we were unsure how we could help her. We reached out to B.P.R and they reassured us they would keep in touch, letting us know when they had room to take her into their care. When we got the thumbs up from B.P.R it was time to try to catch her. It was fun and eventually, we managed to do so and take her to Daleshead vets. She was so friendly and wellbehaved, but she had no microchip and the vet was very concerned about her eye.

Sue from B.P.R kindly collected Ebony from the vet but after a second look at her eye, it was suggested for her to go to an eye specialist clinic. Even though they knew this would cost the charity a fortune, Sue got the backing of the trustees and drove Ebony to Penrith eye specialists.

The news from the eye clinic was shocking. Ebony had been shot in the eye by an air rifle and the pellet was still lodged in her neck. They thought this had probably happened months before and that she had been living in constant pain ever since. This has been reported to the police and RSPCA just in case any more cats in our village are hurt this way.

What was left of the eye was removed, luckily the remaining eye was healthy, and the pellet was also removed from her neck. well, with Sue from B.P.R giving her so much care. She is such an affectionate cat despite what she has been put through.

We just wanted to say an enormous thank you to all the amazing volunteers who give up their time, care, and homes to help animals like Ebony.

B.P.R saved Ebony's life and when fully recovered she will go to give love, joy, and companionship to her new owners.

> Tickets are available from Flower Club members or by ringing 01729 840331. They cost £15 but include a complimentary glass of wine. There will also be a sales table with Christmas decorations and plants. Doors open at 6.30pm so you have a chance to peruse the sales table and enjoy your glass of wine.

Although Nick's arrangements will be large and I would imagine full of sparkles, you can achieve a lovely arrangement for Christmas with a few red carnations, some greenery from the garden and some sparkle in the form of red baubles stuck on kebab sticks and three or four midollino sticks.

This arrangement idea appeared in the Flower Arranger magazine several years ago. This was constructed in a red pot about 60 cm in diameter and a block of wet oasis cut to fit. Or you could insert a glass container inside the pot to hold water and crumpled chicken wire to secure your stems. The long stems of conifer had wire wrapped around the stems, so they could be shaped. The small baubles were glued to wooden kebab sticks so they could be placed in the oasis.

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# Memories of Hellifield, by Brian Shorrock (as told to Ken Leak)

Brian Shorrock has lived in Settle since the early 1960's, but grew up in Hellifield. Brian was born in Hellifield in 1935 and lived at 16 Thornview Road. He has many memories of Hellifield during the 1940's – many of which relate to his childhood during the war years.

Brian has been good enough to put pen to paper and write various articles on different themes. His recollections all paint a picture of the village of Hellifield in days gone by. Brian has asked me to produce his memories for our magazine, and this will be the second article on a variety of themes from him - all of which give us a nostalgic look back on Brian's childhood, and memories of a time when the sound of the steam locomotive was an ever present reminder of the village's role as a busy railway junction. railwaymen, and in July 1945 the L.M.S (London, Midland & Scottish Railway Company) featured the Shorrocks in their magazine 'Carry On'. The article is shown below. Brian's father was Harry Shorrock who was an engine driver at Hellifield Shed.

Brian recalls his memories of the Railway at Hellifield:

'In my younger days, most Hellifield residents worked on the railway in some capacity or other. Either as engine drivers, fireman, platelayers, fitters, or porters, to name just a few of the railway occupations which made up



there are seven Shorrocks at Hellifield M.P.D. and they're all blood relations. Brothers Jack, Fred, Ted and Harry are all drivers, Brother Bill is a Fitter's Mate, and Jim and Alan, sons of Jack are both passed cleaners. Thus they are carrying on the tradition established by driver William Shorrock (father of the brothers), who came to Hellifield, on the very first day the Shed was opened and remained there until his retirement 45 years later. Altogether Messrs. Shorrocks have put in 191 years service at Hellifield Shed. A fine record, indeed.

the workforce of this busy railway station. When I was a boy I would occasionally visit my father – Harry Shorrock – who was an engine driver at the Hellifield Shed, where engines were repaired and serviced. I vividly remember the smoky and steam laden atmosphere. Dimly lit by what I thought were oil lamps. Oil and grease seemed to be everywhere. The steam engines were huge.

Standing at the same level, and not on an elevated platform, they towered over me. The wheels themselves were much higher than me. Never mind the rest of the structure!

When at work my father came and went at all hours, as this was a very busy railway junction. He often started at 2 a.m. - or finished at that time. Whilst I still enjoy seeing steam engines passing through, I was aware that they were very uncomfortable to work on. Burns and scalds were a hazard from the many valves and pipes. There were no toilets, and eyes were injured by bits of grit from the funnel, when peering out to view signals etc. Once or twice I got a lift on the footplate with one of my uncles. This was illegal of course, and on board you were either roasted by the fire, or frozen when standing away from it. The whole engine would be rattling and moving from side to side. I sometimes wondered how we managed to get under a bridge. But we always did. Coal fell – or was pushed from the tender down an embankment to keep the home fires burning. These grassy embankments were burnt on an annual basis, thus stopping regular embankment fires, which still occasionally occur today.

During the war, when I was about eight years old, many troop trains passed through and stopped at Hellifield Station. The troop trains were packed with Americans en-route to Europe. These Americans were very generous, throwing out chewing gum and chocolate. The latter – we were totally unable to purchase. Otherwise we were very well fed at home. Once the word spread in the village, dozens of children descended on the station. Inevitably, it became too much for the railway staff and rather annoyingly we were all banned from the platform. The

station itself had a refreshment room and a W. H. Smiths bookstall. There were also waiting rooms and toilets. There was a regular passenger service from a bay on the eastern end of the platform where you could travel on the many frequent trains which went down the 'Lanky Line' to Clitheroe, Blackburn, Preston etc. As my father received half-price tickets on any train, and also three free passes anywhere on the network, it was used frequently. Sadly and strangely, no regular passenger service exists today. Near the repair shed was a turntable which was operated manually. Further east was a large coal bunker where coal was loaded and unloaded. On the hillside between the turntable and the coal bunker, was a large advertising board which depicted two large men carrying a plank on which was printed 'Sissons Paint Manufacturer'. Presumably this was a metal and/or wooden structure, as it stood for many vears.

At the junction of the Leeds and Blackburn line was a cattledock for transporting and delivering animals to the area. At the very join of the two rail lines was a small underground air raid shelter. It may still exist in spite of the housing estate which has now been built on the land where the cattledock and sidings were located. A subway connected the road from the station entrance, and still does. A bell could be rung at the bottom end, so a porter would come down the slope with a heavy truck with metal wheels to collect luggage from the many railway travellers. Not too bad coming down but hard going up! The road and entrance to the station was not visible from the platform, so as young boys we would press the bell and watch from a distance as a porter came down to find no passengers anywhere. He would

have to push the heavy truck back up the subway. Luckily we were not caught. Punishment would have been severe.

Thankfully the station still flourishes and should still continue to do so for many years.'

Brian has recalled many memories of Hellifield Station during his childhood in the 1940's. Many of the features he has pointed out are memorable to me. Particularly the engine shed, turntable, coaling stage, and also the advertising board featuring two men carrying a board advertising paint. The shed, turntable, and coaling stage were all still in use when I moved to Hellifield in 1960. Interestingly, the air raid shelter he speaks of is, as far as I know, still in -situ. During the 1970's myself and a group of lads sneaked into it, and it was full of old railway paperwork, tools etc. The paperwork consisted of old LMS handbills, memo's, adverts, etc. John Pearcy and I 'retrieved' much of it (if retrieved is the right word) for it was all interesting stuff and dated back many years. There will be more from Brian in further issues of the magazine.
