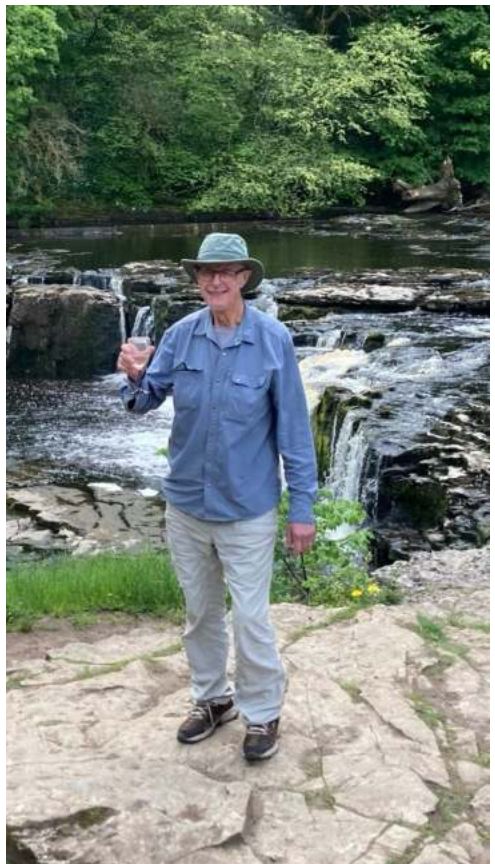

Hellifield Back Lane

It's not really called 'Back Lane' at all. Think of ghosts and ghoulies and you may come across the term 'boggart'. That is the original name of this very old lane which borders Hellifield Beck. The origins of the name 'Boggart Lane' seem to be lost in time. Commonly called 'Back Lane' by residents, it meandours its way under the railway bridge which carries the 'Lanky Line' and terminates at the busy A682 Gisburn to Long Preston Road. A dissappointly short lane some might say. Not quite long enough for a decent walk. And yet the Lane itself is very old and can be seen on many old maps. The name Boggart relates to a ghost, phantom, or supernatural being from English folklore, and the Lane is named as such on the original ordnance survey maps from over 150 years ago, and even old maps preceding the ordnance survey.

Perhaps some long forgotten spooky event occurred along its path to give the Lane its old name. The Lane is quiet and bordered by trees for some of its route. The wind whispers through the branches. The birds and rabbits plus sheep and cattle which occupy the land and adjacent fields are often the sole occupants. Traffic is rare, though one can often be surprised by the appearance of a car or cyclists, which can catch one unawares when walking down the lane. Motorists are often using sat-nav which inadvertently or not takes them along the route of this very narrow highway, to lead them either into or from the village. I've yet to witness two vehicles from either direction meeting head on somewhere along the lane, but it would result in some serious reversing by the drivers when that happens.

The Back Lane is bisected by an old footpath which originates at the Green near what was Phillips Farm and passes close to the Grange. It then terminates on the Lane and recommences it's route via a stile which leads into the Beck field. The path traverses the beck via the stone

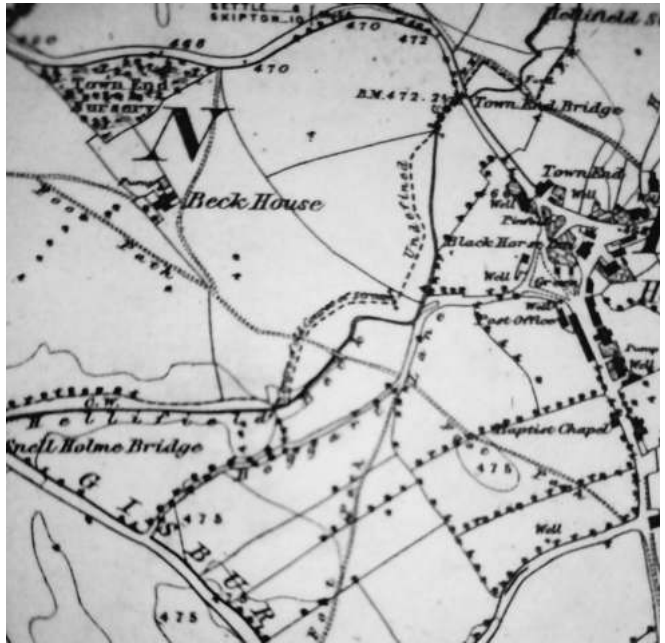
bridge and crosses the fields near Beck House via more stiles and gates and finally ends up in the small

settlement of Gallaber, near to the caravan park. Here another old lane leads past a bungalow and once again terminates at the A682. This area is known as Lower Bend Gate. Bend Gate settlement itself is further along the road towards Long Preston. An old watercourse known as Bend Gate Syke passes under this lane and crosses the fields where it joins Gallaber Syke beck adjacent to the sewerage treatment plant. This stream then joins Hellfield Beck further down the fields where it becomes Pan Beck (Pan - the ancient word meaning joined) before it carries on to enter the Ribble at Halton West bridge.

For many years the Back Lane was used for driving livestock from nearby

fields into the village. I have memories myself of working at the Auction Mart and being sent with other lads to bring cows along the lane and through the village to the Mart. This was always

early in the morning and usually prior to cattle sales. It was no easy task getting them across the main road, and for anyone keen on gardening there was always plenty of fresh fertiliser available left along our route!

There was also a rather awkward incident with a council road roller which was parked on the lane now occupied by the seat and bench. This patch of land was used for chippings and salt storage and the huge road roller was left with the means of starting it with either a key or bent nail in the ignition. Unfortunately I was part of the small group of miscreants who (purely out of curiosity of course) started it up and

drove it straight forward over the banking and into the beck. Escapes were quickly made and being very young there were no charges made. The council were largely at fault anyway for not immobilising the vehicle.

So, for many years the Back Lane has remained a largely unchanged feature of the village and is a popular haunt of dog-walkers and locals who want a breath of fresh air without undue exertion.

Long may it continue.

Hellifield village magazine Annual Report and Financial Statement

April 2024 to March 2025

This annual report of the Hellifield Magazine Management Committee is printed in the magazine so everyone can clearly see how 'your' magazine is performing. It will be formally presented to the annual meeting, to be held on **Wednesday 15th October 2025 at 3.00 pm in the Village Hall (Institute).**

This is an open invitation to all readers to come along to see first-hand the processes followed in producing your regular 'local read'. There will be a presentation of the statement of financial activities and the election of officers to the management committee will take place. If anyone wishes to nominate themselves or anyone else (with their permission) to sit on the management committee, please do so in writing to the Secretary, Carol Weston-Moore, 9 Newton Way, **by Monday, 6th October 2025.**

Commitments - Since inception of the magazine in June 2019, we have

provided ten free editions per year, combining August/September and December/January. A magazine is distributed to each household in the Hellifield district with a few extra copies available from H's village store. At the time of writing, this totals 750 copies. We aim to get the magazine out by the first of the month and since changing our printing contractor mid-year, this target has been met.

Management Committee - Our management committee team has remained constant over the year. We are eight in number and our details are listed at the back of the magazine. Some of us are, however, ageing somewhat and we would welcome new recruits working with us to take over our roles in coming months/years. Do get in touch if you are interested. We each take on a specific role and work to a formally agreed constitution. We meet three times a year to ensure

everything is running smoothly. We ensure there are sufficient funds to cover all costs involved.

Finance - The Statement of Financial Activities is available on request.

In the year ended 31st March we recorded a small deficit of £104. Early in the year our printing contractor ceased trading and we had to search for a replacement while accepting that the previous rate was low. The committee is very pleased with the new printing contractor but going forward the annual printing cost will be £1000 higher at about £4000. The committee has decided not to increase advertising rates at this stage, instead using some of the healthy reserve of nearly £3,000 which is close to the maximum our rules allow.

Income is stable. In the year ended 31st March we again received a welcome grant of £250 from the Parish Council and a much appreciated donation of £500 from the Beer Festival Committee. Above that, we received over £600 from donations, Friends and the coffee morning income. Advertisers contributed £2360.

The expenditure of £3,800 covered printing costs, meeting room hire and bank charges.

Content - We endeavour to make the magazine content of interest with a mix of articles and advertisements, as this is our main aim. It is also essential that we make the magazine visually attractive with a combination of photographs and drawings. During the year, we have changed the way we present the 'events taking place' section so that it takes up less room and is easier to follow. This is a hard task as so much does happen in Hellfield.

Changing our printing contractor has

enabled us to improve the printing quality of the magazine making the photographs in particular more pronounced and pleasing to the eye.

New contributors are welcomed. We value immensely our regular contributors but there are so many stories to tell, old and new, so don't be shy and do share your tale. Detail of how to do this is set out beneath the contents section of each magazine.

Thanks - Besides the individual contribution of the magazine management committee members, so many others are involved to enable the magazine to reach every household ten times a year. Each give of their time freely and in good spirit. It is impossible to mention individuals by name as there are so many but special thanks go to the article contributors, the band of distributors who deliver the magazines in all weathers and to our advertisers, who provide the backbone of our income. Thanks also to those who have provided financial support as outlined in the financial statement above.

Lastly, but most importantly, we thank all our readers for your support and encouragement throughout the last year. We welcome friendly criticism if something is not to your liking but we sincerely hope you enjoy hearing the magazine drop through your letter box knowing there will be some local fun and interesting items to read.

Hellifield Flashes update

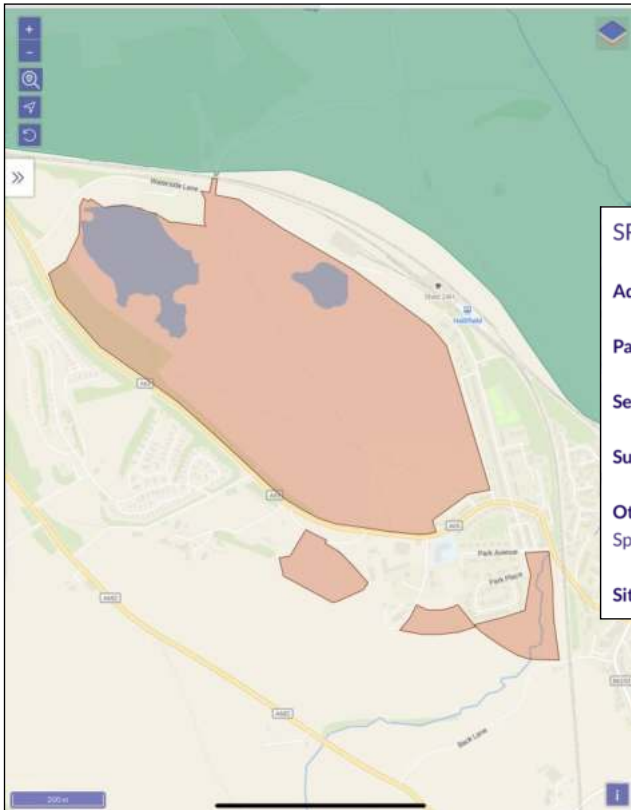
A call for development sites has recently resulted in the owners of the land where the Flashes are, submitting a suggestion for Residential use. Other uses are given as Retail, Open Space, Leisure, Other (station car park). There is no immediate facility for commenting on this. There are ongoing consultations about the draft Local Plan - look out for the next consultation in Autumn. It is complicated, but worth trying if you care about what might happen to the village in the future.

More information on the North Yorkshire Council website – search for 'The North Yorkshire Local Plan'.

The map shows that the whole area is submitted for Residential, apart from the two sites at the entrance to Waterside Lane where there is already planning permission for a hotel and car

park. If Residential use gets into the Local Plan, it would make combatting future planning applications much more difficult. There are other options for designations, such as Environmental Enhancement schemes, renewable energy generation and biodiversity.

Artists in Hellifield: Mollie Murfin

My name is Molly and I am an artist living in the village specializing in hand embroidery for fashion. Last year I graduated from the Royal School of Needlework at Hampton Court Palace in London where I studied hand embroidery for three years. While at the Royal School of Needlework I had the opportunity to work on some amazing projects including stitching the anointing screen for the King's Coronation in 2023.



My favourite project which I have stitched was called Reflections (seen in the photos) and was for my final major project in my final year at university. The theme of this project comes from my love of symmetrical patterns. I believe that symmetry can create a sense of personal harmony in a similar way to that which nature can make you feel.

The embroidery on the jacket is symmetrical on both sides and connecting on the jacket. The jacket is made to be worn outside in nature to encourage the wearer to reconnect with nature as I did when creating the jacket.

The fabric of the jacket is made from thick Yorkshire wool. My embroidery style is playful with embroidery techniques such as raised work using thin wire to create 3D elements, allowing the petals and leaves to be moved into different shapes. The colours which I used on this piece are bold and vibrant portraying the natural brightness of nature. The embroidery techniques which I used throughout my jacket include raised work, crewelwork, applique, beadwork and goldwork.

North Craven Flower Club

Our June meeting was a trip to Littlethorpe Manor, a family home owned by the Thackery family in the village of Littlethorpe near Ripon. It is set in 11 acres of grounds. Four of these acres are formal gardens that have been developed since 1998 under the supervision of Head Gardener Eddie Harland.

The gardens first opened to the public in 2002 through the National Garden Scheme and this year it will be open on 6th July 1.30pm to 5.00pm. Other times it is only open to groups that have been pre-booked.

We are now in the season of summer weddings and family celebrations. However, flowers have become increasingly expensive and although a daunting task, some decide to do the flowers themselves as we have done for our daughters and their weddings. I would recommend that you order your flowers from a florist that you trust to ensure that your flowers are of good quality and will last for several days. I



potted Hydrangeas down the aisle rather than pew ends. These were then taken to the reception to decorate there too. Battery lights were placed in the branches which were then lit in the evening. Some family members then got a plant to take home and put in their garden!

The table decoration to the left uses a £1 vase from Ikea, a plastic dish and oasis. In the bottom is crumpled cellophane which was then filled with water. This gives the effect that the base is filled with ice! I used greenery from the garden, roses and gypsophila probably from Tesco or M & S. A good supply of inexpensive mechanics is The Range. Or you can borrow/hire vases etc. from a florist.

have never done the bouquets and buttonholes but have done flowers for the church and reception. On both occasions I have gone with the mantra of 'simple but effective'! This helps with the cost and enabling others to help with putting the arrangements together otherwise it's a big task to do on your own. Growing your own flowers is another way of keeping costs down, but it's not always guaranteed that the flowers will be ready at the right time and then in the quantity that you require. In which case some bought and some grown is a good way to go. We grew sunflowers for one wedding. Some bloomed too early but we picked them, dried the petals and then packaged them up as bio-degradable confetti!

On North Craven Flower Club's Instagram account, we have several stories for ideas for pew ends and table decoration ideas. Pinterest is also a good source of ideas but there are also some very grand ideas too that would need a large budget!

One wedding I went to used blue

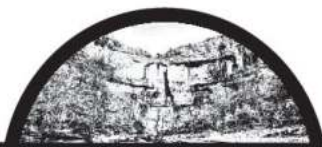

Charlie and Flo

Meet Charlie and Flo, a pair of Working Cocker Spaniels. Though Carol and I don't have dogs now, we have both had dogs in the past. We did debate getting a dog on our move to Hellfield 21 years ago but decided that travel was a greater priority.

My first dog as a child was a German Shepherd called Major. He was originally from the police kennels but was never trained as a police dog. Though immensely powerful he could be extremely gentle with small children and anyone he felt vulnerable. Toby, a mixed breed was the second family dog from my late teens. When I married and after dad sadly died, he kept mum company for a number of years.

Fast forward to the 1990s and my eldest son did work experience in a veterinary practice before going to university. A stray dog had been brought in and Phil persuaded us to give him a home. So Ben joined the family which by that time included a farm cat called Tiger. We found out why he was a stray as any time he could, he would run away. We could never walk him off the lead and always kept gates shut.

So, back to Charlie (the black dog) and Flo. These belong to my granddaughter, who is a keen dog trainer. She has had Charlie for a few years, trains him for agility events and



regularly competes with him in competitions. Flo, who was born in March this year has just joined the family much to Charlie's consternation. Latest reports though suggest he is learning to cope with his new house mate as the photo shows. I look forward to meeting Flo soon and hearing how the training and dog friendship is going.

Beech turns into Ash

Some of you will remember my red border collie, Teasel. Perhaps from walks around the village or more likely as a regular visitor to the Black Horse. She sadly died last December 2024; she was just over 14 and had very bad arthritis. Like many owners of pets who have died, I was heartbroken and swore not to have another again.

Those famous last words lasted until early March this year, when I bumped into one of the vet nurses I knew from Dalehead Vets, in Settle. On the spur of the moment I just asked that if she knew of any farmers with a collie they didn't want, to let me know.

Two weeks later, on Thursday 20th March, the call came that there was a dog available at Golcar Farm, Baildon Moor. The Farm is run by Barbara Sykes and her daughter, Vickie and is a working farm that trains, as well as acting as a rescue centre, for collies. A quick phone call, and on the following day, at around 2 pm, I was introduced to Pendro, or Pero, a male Welsh border collie, aged about two, that had failed its sheep herding training. There was some confusion to the actual name, the farm spelling him as Pero (Spanish for dog), but more likely is the name Pendro (the Welsh for dizzy). The latter seems to me to sum-up his character in a pleasant, happy sort of way.

The introduction lasted about three quarters of an hour. Pendro, who was extremely nervous, tail permanently between the legs, would approach on coaxing, then at the slightest movement cower away. The same applied to strange noises. We slowly assessed each other, while Vickie quite rightly quizzed me as to suitability as an owner. I have had four border collies and so assume this helped me pass muster. I was told that Pendro was officially classed as abandoned and had been left at the farm by a farmer who would not come back to pick him up. He had been at the farm for four months, and after three months, I was told, could be legally passed on as a rescue.

Pendro was quickly renamed as Beech by me, as I live on Beech Court. That

was until that same Friday evening when chatting to a friend he joked that "come here beech" would make no sound like a posh individual being offensive to a female dog. So within six hours, and three names, Beech quickly became Ash and took to his name within two to three days. Ash had spent all his life in barns, never been in a house and had also never been jabbed. The day after collecting Ash I was able to get him jabbed at Dalehead Vets. It took about 10 days till I was free of carpet cleaning, and slightly longer till Ash got used to household noises.

Ash has slowly gained confidence and is a very affectionate dog with a good temperament. His tail is now upright and wagging a lot. A complete contrast to the dog I collected nearly three months ago. I now know why his work training did not work, he is fixated with playing with other dogs and the smells in the grass and does not obey the recall if distracted. Otherwise, his training is progressing, may take some time, but of one thing I am sure, the farmer's loss is my gain.
