

Flower Club: answers to the quiz on p.7

A is Marmite. It uses a tall black vase with red midollino sticks made into spirals at the base. There are bold strelitzia, yellow spray carnations, leucadendron and craspedia (yellow pom poms that can be dried)

B is Africa, and uses dried aspidistra leaves, photinia leaves that have the red new growth, kangaroo paw, tangerine carnations, leucadendron, pink orchid woven palm leaves and pink spray carnations.

C is CD rack as an old CD rack with oasis blocks attached at the top and bottom, has been used as the frame. The main flowers are blue delphiniums, blue gentians, memory lane roses, purple tulips, lilac freesia, purple iris and purple clematis

D is Windmills of your Mind and uses a mantle vase which has a metal ring covered in white yarn making the 'Windmill'. Flowers used are white anthuriums, white lilies, white Ranunculus and green carnations placed inside the circle.

E is Hollywood using silver sprayed palm leaves, white Anthuriums, white gerbera, red carnations and white ostrich feathers. It reminded me of Marilyn Monroe in the famous scene of the white dress and bright red lipstick.



It always amazes me how the demonstrators use the flowers to create an image, which is why, I suppose, it is called 'Floral Art'. They must spend a considerable time making their 'mechanics' and accessories to bring their ideas alive.

'Sharp as ever I see. Well we don't think the police have done enough to investigate it so we are doing their job for them.


ʻl might have known! What have you got so far.

Gargrave Art Exhibition 2024

With at last sixty artists exhibiting and hundreds of artworks to savour, we welcome a thousand or so visitors. With our thanks to Ken Leak, a much respected and widely published illustrator and supporter of the show.



Ken writes:

"Born in Colne but resident from three years old in Hellifield, my earliest memories of art and drawing were sitting on the carpet copying popular cartoon characters. Aged about 12, I read a book written and illustrated by D.J. Watkins-Pitchford. Called Brendon Chase, it concerned the story of 3 young lads who run away from home and live by hunting and fishing in a large forest. It was the pictures drawn using 'scraperboard' technique that truly captivated me and is an interest that has never left me. The method involved scraping or etching away the black chalk covering on the scraperboard to

reveal the white surface below. Different sizes of nib would produce different effects. The resulting drawing was a very atmospheric illustration which emphasised the effects of light and shade.

After leaving school and deciding not to pursue art at college, I spent 4 happy years at Skipton Tax Office where my skills at cartoons and amusing illustrations were employed to good effect for birthday gifts, leaving presents etc. I joined the RAF in 1980 and throughout my military career, my artwork was used in MOD publications, often reflecting the humorous side of service life.



"VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE" June 2024

Some of our readers will know that, for the month of April, and into May, I've been helping Mrs Rodley in her recovery from a hip replacement operation. As I write this on the early May bank holiday, all has gone as well as could be expected, although those of you who've had this procedure will know that you really mustn't rush things, or attempt to do stuff too soon. Being both impatient and clumsy, and not able to bend down very easily (i.e. I struggle to do the household tasks that Nicky, by the nature of her surgery, can't do right now, and normally does so effortlessly), I'm not exactly an ideal companion to have around the home in these circumstances!

And with the need to keep our son Aidan fed, safe and entertained as well, it's seemed at times that I could do with a few more waking hours in the day. But we're getting there, and I'm grateful to those who've offered practical help for us, and our church officers who've put up with me being, shall we say, a bit distracted!

But for all my challenges in the weeks after Easter, they pale into insignificance compared to the caring burdens borne by a huge number of people in modern Britain - probably many more than official statistics recognise, and certainly a subject which politicians of all persuasions are very quiet about. After all, just think what it would cost the state if folk didn't look after their elderly parents or disabled children in the kindly, loving way that so many people just get on with. And for all the unpleasant stories about people in the care of their relatives being exploited and abused, they remain a rare exception. For example, for all that some folk love to complain about the apparently relaxed, well-off lifestyle of the "retired", the reality is often rather different. I had a "retired" clergy colleague in Bournemouth in her mid-70s who was a full-time carer for her 98-year-old father. Mercifully for both of them, she had the reserves of skills and patience

that I sadly lack!

So please remember those with big burdens of care: hold them in your prayers if that's something you do. I don't think they'll get much attention in the election campaign that will be upon us later in the year, and too many of our opinion-formers in the media are apt to forget that we all have the Christian church (learning from the ancient Jewish faith) to thank for the notion that in Britain, we care for those who need it, and call to account those who fail in their responsibilities to do so. For that matter, we have over 1,400 years of the Christian church in Britain to thank for the whole "schools and hospitals" agenda too, but that's something for another day......And please don't forget that many carers don't like to ask for help, and certainly won't own up to the struggles that caring for the sick and vulnerable usually brings.

There was a nasty headline (one of many, I'm afraid) last year that Russian security services had a plan to round up several million homeless, elderly, vulnerable and even disabled people to make them go off to the front line in Ukraine. I thank God daily that, for all our society's faults, in modern Britain we care for people like this, and expect them to be cared for.
